1. Background

In commemoration of the 1990 Innocenti Declaration, World Breastfeeding Week (WBW) is celebrated every 1-7 August. In 1992, WBW started with annual themes including healthcare systems, women and work, the International Code of Marketing of Breastmilk Substitutes, community support, ecology, economy, science, education and human rights. Since 2016, WBW is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In 2018, a World Health Assembly resolution endorsed WBW as an important breastfeeding promotion strategy.

Breastfeeding is the cornerstone of infant and young child survival, nutrition, development and maternal health. This year's theme being — Protecting Breastfeeding: A Shared Responsibility as mentioned by WABA and on similar lines by BPNI - Protecting Breastfeeding: Where lies the Responsibility?. Focusing towards protection of breastfeeding women from the commercial influence of the baby food industry, supported at work places and in the hospitals where they come to deliver.

Although support at the individual level is very important, breastfeeding must be considered a public health issue that requires investment at all levels. The concept of 'building back better' after the COVID 19 pandemic will provide an opportunity to create a warm chain of support for breastfeeding that includes health systems, workplaces and communities at all levels of society. A warm chain of support will help build an enabling environment for breastfeeding and protect against industry influence. It is time to inform, anchor, engage and galvanise action to protect breastfeeding at all levels.(1)

1.2. Theme: Protecting Breastfeeding: A Shared Responsibility / Where lies the Responsibility?

Breastfeeding significantly improves the health, survival and wellbeing of infants, children and their mothers. It is one of the best investment, for saving lives and improving the health, social and economic development of individuals and nation. A public health approach to breastfeeding is needed to build back system in normal and crisis situation. We need to ensure consistent message and proper referral system throughout the warm chain, to protect breastfeeding dyad. All parents with young children should have access to skilled breastfeeding counselling and support from health facilities It is a shared responsibility to protect, provide and support breastfeeding to achieve sustainable development.

1.3. Brief overview of earlier WBW celebrations at Ramaiah Medical College

Every year, the Department of Community Medicine, Ramaiah Medical College has been celebrating WBW on a large scale at the community level both at urban and rural filed practice areas. Many antenatal mothers, postnatal mothers and their family members have been educated and been provided information for enabling breastfeeding and importance of family support. The Ramaiah Medical College Hospital has been part of the Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative and has organized various workshops for the medical community to be better skilled in supporting breastfeeding mothers. The department felt the importance of breast feeding more so during the pandemic situation where access of care was affected. Hence the department took initiative of celebrating the WBW and special efforts even during the recent COVID pandemic to educate pregnant and post natal mothers the importance of breastfeeding observing necessary COVID appropriate behaviors. The efforts of the instit5ution was recognized by BPNI in 2019 and 2020 with Ramaiah Medical College bagging the coveted 'Best WBW Celebration Award' for its efforts in transpiring the objectives of WBW into reality.

Breastfeeding and COVID 19 pandemic

The best nutrition for the baby begins with breast milk which protects the babies against illness. Disruption of breastfeeding can lead to a drop in milk supply, refusal by the infant to take the breast, and a decrease in protective immune factors contained in breast milk. But mothers will be understandably worried and asking themselves whether coronavirus can be passed on through breast milk and what they can do to protect themselves and their babies.

Key messages to be conveyed to breastfeeding mothers

- 3Ws
 - Wear a mask during feeding
 - Wash hands with soap before and after touching the baby
 - Wipe and disinfect surfaces regularly

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When mothers are too ill to breastfeed, they should seek immediate medical adviceing Hospital Bangalore - 560 054.

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• Use a cup and spoon to feed babies with expressed breast milk when too sick to breastfeed.

Action points for healthcare facilities and their staff

- Healthcare staff while providing maternity and newborn services, should not promote breast milk substitutes, feeding bottles, teats, pacifiers or dummies in any part of the facilities, or by any staff.
- Empower mothers and infants to remain together and practice skin-to-skin contact, and roomingin throughout the day and night, especially straight after birth during establishment of breastfeeding, whether or not the mother or child has suspected, probable, or confirmed COVID-19.

Counselling and psychosocial support

If the mother and her child have suspected or confirmed COVID-19, breastfeeding counselling, basic psychosocial support, or practical feeding support from trained health care professionals and also community-based lay and peer breastfeeding counsellors should be facilitated.

Keeping ongoing COVID pandemic in mind, the WBW was conceptualized and implemented very meticulously with major three activities targeting pregnant and lactating mothers, health care workers and communities; an also on site campus activity to create awareness among students and faculty as well.

3. Preparation for World Breastfeeding Week

The preparation for WBW 2021 was deeply set, keeping in mind the ongoing COVID 19 pandemic. Interns posted to the various health centres of Ramaiah Medical College were trained prior to the campaign and the messages to be conveyed to the community were imparted to them from August 1-7th, 2021. As it was important to address the severe resource crunch with all resources being directed towards handling the pandemic, it was also imperative that this would not become a missed opportunity to reach out to the community to promote breastfeeding and the WBW theme. Hence, it was decided that all possible measures will be taken to reach as many mothers as possible with the available resources. This year Dr. Babitha Rajan, Asst. Prof was asked to forefront and coordinate this year's WBW celebration at Ramaiah Medical College under the guidance of The Head of the Community Medicine Department, Dr. K.Lalitha.

Emphasizing the importance of physical distancing to be followed strictly in order to prevent COVID 19, it was decided that every opportunity where an antenatal or lactating mother come in contact with the health system will be utilized for educating the mother for breastfeeding, a different strategy was applied in urban and rural areas. In the rural area, since we had the facility to reach out to larger audience it was feasible to conduct the awareness session, maintaining physical distancing whereas in the urban area, due to lack of space, a different strategy was adopted i.e. a house to house counselling was given to all the registered

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Medico-social workers assisted the interns at the awareness sessions. Posters and pamphlets were prepared by interns in the local language to convey the benefits of breastfeeding and the importance of continuing breastfeeding during COVID- 19.

A survey on breastfeeding practices among mothers during the COVID pandemic and especially among the COVID infected lactating mothers was conducted by the postgraduates during this campaign.

To create awareness and to encourage students and faculty participation in the WBW week observation, poem writing and pencil sketching competition was organized by the department for the interns, under graduates, post graduates and faculties.

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4. WBW Activities

4.2. Breastfeeding Awareness Campaign

The awareness campaign was conducted in both the rural and urban areas field practice areas and centres of MS Ramaiah Medical College. The Department of Community Medicine trained postgraduates, interns and medico-social workers (MSWs) to deliver the sessions observing thoroughly all precautions against spread of COVID 19, i.e. wearing of masks, hand hygiene and physical distancing. The participants were educated in small groups of 2 or 3 in rural areas or on a one on one basis at urban areas. At the health centres, opportunistic sessions were conducted among the mothers who came for antenatal care checkups or for immunization of their children.

4.2.1. WBW in Rural areas

The rural practicing area of MS Ramaiah Medical College consists of the PHC areas of Kaiwara in the district of Chikaballapur, PHC areas of Avathi in the Devanahalli Taluk and RHTC of Ramaiah Leena of Bangalore Rural District. The awareness campaigns were conducted at the primary helath centre and at the villages as well.

Brief description of the awareness programme:

To observe World Breastfeeding Week 2021, the interns posted at Kaiwara PHC, conducted awareness campaigns to educate expectant and postnatal mothers on various aspects of breastfeeding, the associated benefits and myths and misconceptions surrounding it. Special emphasis was laid on breastfeeding during COVID-19, and the precautions to be taken to ensure mother and child safety.

Mothers and their families were urged to ensure exclusive breastfeeding for the first 6 months and explained why breast milk was ideal for the new born. Advice on nutritive, economically appropriate and acceptable complementary feeding was also given.

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This exercise was done both at the PHC and at the houses of mothers in the villages. Charts and posters in the local language were used to ensure better efficacy. Taking account of the current pandemic and the rising number of cases, appropriate social distancing protocols, usage of masks, face shield and personal protection was ensured.










Figure 2: Glimpses of WBW awareness programme in Kaiwara PHC area

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4.3. Survey on Breastfeeding Practices during COVID 19 Pandemic in Rural And Urban Field Practice Areas

4.3.1. Background

The infection with the Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome Coronavirus 2 (SARS-COV-2) and designated COVID-19 by the World Health Organization (WHO) was first identified in humans in December 2019, in the city of Wuhan, China(2) and can present from asymptomatic to a severe acute respiratory infection requiring intensive care(3)

As the cases vibrantly raised, lead to the initiation of Lockdown period according to rules set by each state Government. This affected humans mentally, physically by restricting to work from home, economically and even all sectors of economy were affected. A pregnant lady who is to undergo regular antenatal checkups would have found it inconvenient to access MCH care and services during this period.

Although many published cases confirm the absence of transmission of the SARS-CoV-2 virus antenatally or intrapartum, emerging evidence suggests that vertical transmission is possible and followed by practices of withholding breastfeeding and separating mom and infant dyad. However, this is still controversial due to a reduced number of reported cases with intrapartum samples (placenta, amniotic fluid, umbilical cord blood), large variability in the type of biological material analyzed and the time of its collection. Hence, such a study was envisaged to know the breastfeeding practices prevalent in urban slum population of M.S. Ramaiah medical college

4.3.2. Methodology

Mothers with children in the age group of 0-2 years who are residing in urban and rural field practice area and are availing the services at the anganwadi centers was approached with the help of Anganwadi workers, junior health assistants, ASHA, USHA. Attempts were made to pool and include the mothers of children who have not been enrolled in the anganwadi.

A semi structured pretested questionnaire was administered after obtaining the informed consent to all the mothers with children between 0-2 years of age. Data regarding socio-demographic details, information on COVID illness, delivery and breastfeeding practices, barriers faced in regard of lactation during pandemic were collected from the study participants.

4.3.3. Preliminary findings

This study is still under the process of completion awaiting to conduct an FGD among the mothers. Therefore, we would like to present a glimpse of the findings of the study:

Out of 39 lactating mothers, only 2 of them were COVID Positive and they are continuing breast feeding and indeed were encouraged breastfeeding during COVID19. They used precautionary measures like mask, hand washing, hygiene, social distancing and these information were provided by Doctors and ANM's. .Both

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
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their babies were not affected.

Among 35 currently lactating mothers, 50% of them had done exclusive breastfeeding, 19% continued to breastfeed and start complementary feeds for 7-9 months. Only 12(30.7%) were vaccinated against COVID-19, 33% reported that they were not informed by any authority that they can get vaccinated,16.6% said as they are lactating, they fear the side effects of vaccine which can affect baby, while 16.6% mothers underwent tubectomy. It was noted that 11.1% of the mothers mentioned that lack of support in caring of baby as a reason for not getting vaccinated. 12(92%) were partially vaccinated for COVID and the source of information on vaccination during lactation were 46% ASHA workers & 35% from Doctors. Almost 28(82.3%) had no difficulty in accessing MCH care and out of 3(12.5%) who had difficulty in accessing MCH care, 33.3% had equal reasons as lockdown, felt there were no need of postnatal mothers and improper referral system.








Figure 6: Survey of lactating mother in urban slum

World Rabies Day is an opportunity to reflect on how rabies impacts your community and other communities around the world. The best way to protect you, your family, and your pets is to keep dogs and cats up-to-date on their rabies vaccinations. You can also protect you and your family by travelling smart, and avoiding contact with dogs and other animals that may have rabies when you travel outside the country.

World Rabies Day is an opportunity to reflect on how rabies impacts your community and other communities around the world. While rabies is a 100% preventable disease, more than 59,000 people die from the disease around the world each year. World Rabies Day is an opportunity to reflect on our efforts to control this deadly disease and remind ourselves that the fight is not yet over.

This year's World Rabies Day theme is: "Rabies: Facts, not Fear". The global COVID-19 pandemic has raised many doubts and misconceptions about diseases, their spread and about vaccination in general. Because of this, there has been some hesitancy about the roll-out of the COVID-19 vaccines in many countries and many people are afraid to get vaccinated. For rabies, this is nothing new, as fears, misconceptions and misinformation about the disease and its prevention dates back hundreds of years. For that reason, this year's theme is focused on sharing facts about rabies, and not spreading fear about the disease by relying on misinformation and myths.

Facts: Facts are essential for raising disease awareness, preventing rabies cases, having the animal population vaccinated, and educating people about the dangers of rabies and how to prevent it. Without facts we would not have data for decision-makers to inform them of the serious nature of the disease. We would not be able to advocate for its elimination and the burden of the disease would remain unknown, resulting in tens of thousands of people and animals continuing to die from rabies each year. Let us use facts to raise awareness and educate others about rabies - a 99% fatal, yet 100% preventable disease.

Fear: The word "fear" has three meanings in this year's theme. Firstly, it relates to the general fear caused by rabies, the fear people experience when encountering rabid animals, and the fear that people live with in communities plagued by rabies. The second meaning relates directly to the symptom of fear that people may experience when infected with rabies. Lastly, fear relates to the fear caused by 'fake news' or myths about rabies - making people afraid of vaccination, making people afraid to get their animals sterilized or vaccinated, and making people believe in ineffective treatments for the disease.

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As a part of World Rabies Day 2021, a State Level Quiz on rabies for the undergraduate students was held at Mandya Institute of Medical Sciences, Mandya on 28th September 2021. With this regard, the qualifying round was organized by the Department of Community Medicine, Ramaiah Medical College and coordinated by Dr.Pavithra Cheluvaraj on September 17th,2021.

Questions comprised of the multiple choice questions and fill in the blanks. The quiz competition was coordinated by Dr Pavithra Cheluvaraj, Assistant Professor, Department of Community Medicine. 7 teams participated with 2 members in each team. 5 teams from 7th Term, one team each from 1st and 4th term participated. Top two teams scoring highest marks participated in the State Level world rabies day quiz 2021 held at Mandya Institute of Medical Sciences, Mandya on 30th September 2021.

Report of the World Environment Day- 2021 "Ecosystem Restoration"

Preamble:

The United Nations (UN) named 5 June as international World Environment Day at the Stockholm Conference on the Human Environment in 1972. The idea was to draw attention to the many problems that are facing our environment. They wanted to include as many people, organisations and governments, both local and national, as possible. They wanted to show that positive change is possible when people work together to fight for a common cause.

The theme for World Environment Day 2021 is "Ecosystem Restoration" and will see the launch of the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration. Ecosystem restoration can take many forms: Growing trees, greening cities, rewilding gardens, changing diets or cleaning up rivers and coasts. This is the generation that can make peace with nature. Ecosystem restoration means assisting in the recovery of ecosystems that have been degraded or destroyed, as well as conserving the ecosystems that are still intact. Proceedings:


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

Dr.Medha Y Rao spoke passionately about environmental conservation and narrated the qualities one would develop through the simple act of nurturing and caring for a plant from the seedling to a tree.

This was followed by the panel discussion moderated by Dr. Shalini Nooyi. After introduction of the panellist, Dr Ragotham Rao spoke about the efforts required to preserve the fragile ecosystem and the role of every human being in this context.
